Contextual information

St Peter's is an established triple stream Catholic co-educational primary school situated within 10 kilometers of the Perth CBD. The school has an enrolment of 766 students from Pre Kindy to Year 6 and draws the majority of students from within the Parish of Bedford/Inglewood.

The staff provides an integrated curriculum for all students with Religious Education as the focus. The curriculum draws together the concepts, knowledge, skills, attitudes and values in developing the competencies of expressing, investigating, communicating, creating and reflecting. There is a range of specialist programs including Music, Physical Education, Dance/Drama, Italian, MiniLit, MacqLit, Bond Blocks, Extending Mathematical Understanding and AQUINAS (Gifted and Talented).

The school endeavours to establish close links with parents that result in greater involvement by parents in schooling and other activities; better connection between parents and teachers; community building; and ultimately, better outcomes for students. The school also enjoys a strong relationship with the local St Peter's Parish and Parish Priest, Fr Jeronimo Flamenco.

Should this fail to see an acceptable rate of attendance, it is legal requirement of the school to have the Department of Education intervene.

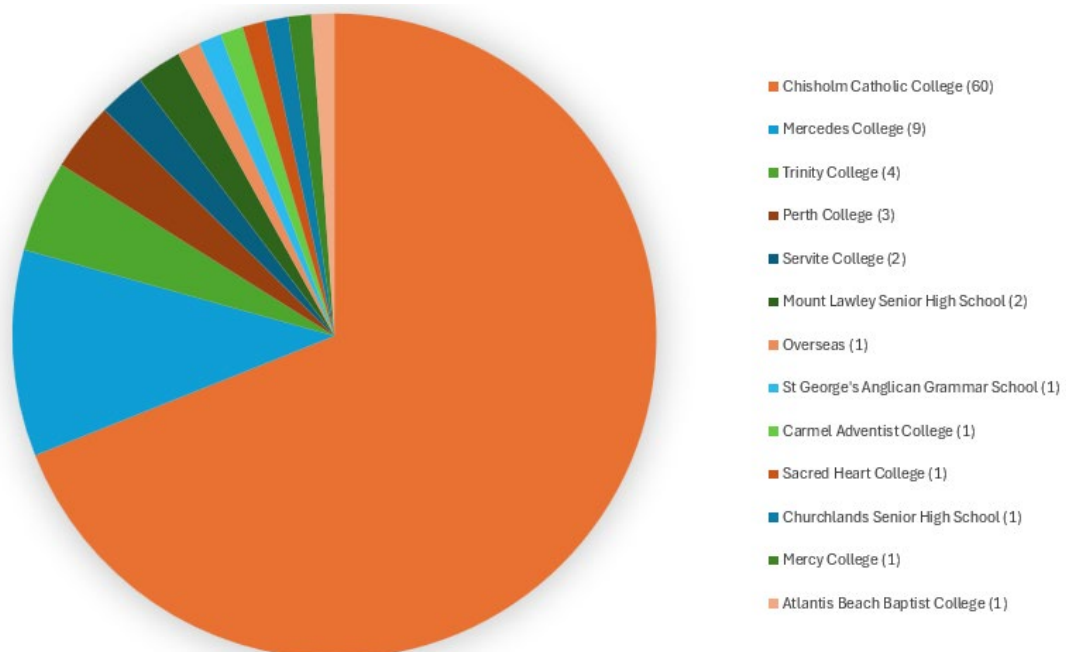

GREG GREEN, PRINCIPAL

As I reflect on my time at St Peter's, I feel incredibly grateful for the warm welcome I received upon joining the school community in Term Two. From the moment I arrived, I was embraced by our wonderful staff and students, making the transition into the role of Principal both smooth and uplifting.

I would like to acknowledge and thank Justin Tuohy for his strong leadership of St Peter's; I had the pleasure of walking into a well-oiled machine. I particularly noticed a united and positive staff, as well as a school who lead the way in terms of stewardship and work health and safety, a testament to my predecessors.

The spirit of St Peter's is truly special. Our students bring joy and curiosity to every corner of the school, and our staff demonstrate unwavering dedication and care in all they do. There are many programs and initiatives that make St Peter's such a dynamic and engaging place to learn and grow. One standout is URSTRONG, a friendship strategy-based program that equips students with tools to navigate the complexities of friendship and build healthy, respectful relationships. I wandered into the MiniLit and MacqLit tutoring spaces and found two exceptional literacy intervention programs that support students in developing strong foundational reading skills and confidence in their learning. Additionally, our Bond Maths program plays a vital role in developing students' numeracy literacy, helping them build essential mathematical understanding and problem-solving skills in a structured and supportive way.

Our Catholic Performing Arts program is another shining example of the vibrancy of our school. With a great choir, talented band, and expressive dancers, our students have many opportunities to showcase their creativity and passion. The wealth of talent across all year levels is truly inspiring and adds joyful energy to our school community.

The AQUINAS program offers students a unique dimension to explore, question, and research. It encourages curiosity, critical thinking, and deeper engagement with learning—empowering students to stretch their minds and discover new possibilities beyond the standard curriculum. These are only a few of the exceptional initiatives flourishing within our school.

It is a pleasure to share with you some of the major projects and developments taking place at St Peter's Primary School as we continue to enhance our learning environment for all students.

Canteen Refurbishment - we now have a fully refurbished, state-of-the-art commercial kitchen that meets all required health and safety regulations, and supports the needs of our large and growing school community. This upgrade not only ensures compliance, but also improves functionality and efficiency for our canteen team. Thank you to the OSH Committee for their ongoing support and generous contributions in bringing this project to life.

Redevelopment of Early Childhood playground - construction will begin during the January holidays, with the playground ready for students by the start of Term One, 2026. This space has been designed with strong input from both students and teachers, ensuring it reflects their needs and aspirations. The design also aligns with the ELFY outcomes, allowing for outdoor play that meaningfully supports early learning, wellbeing and whole-child development.

Over the next 12 months - our priority remains ensuring all buildings across the campus are safe, compliant and well-maintained. We also have new furniture budgeted for both our Year 5 and Year 6 classrooms, supporting contemporary learning practices. In addition, some cosmetic upgrades are planned for several Year 5 rooms to refresh and modernise the learning environment. These projects reflect our ongoing commitment to providing the very best for our students—safe, engaging, and inspiring spaces that support high-quality learning and wellbeing.

2025 Sacramental Program - we continue to work in close partnership with the Parish to ensure our students and their families are supported with the knowledge and understanding they need to fully prepare for each Sacrament. Our Sacramental Program follows the sequence of Reconciliation in Year Three, First Holy Communion in Year Four, and Confirmation in Year Six.

In 2025, 289 students participated in the Sacramental Program, along with additional students who joined us from the Parish. This reflects the strong Catholic identity of our school community and the trust families place in St Peter's to guide their children on their faith journey.

Thank you to our Sacramental Coordinator, Marina Tassone, for her dedication, organisation and unwavering commitment to ensuring every child experiences a meaningful and memorable Sacramental celebration. Marina, together with her husband Mario, continues to bring the church to life for our students through her passion and service.

Each Mass this year was a wonderful opportunity for our community to gather in faith. Celebrating with the candidates and their families allowed us to share in their joy and express our ongoing support and congratulations. I extend my sincere gratitude to Father Jeronimo, the teachers involved, and all who contributed to these special celebrations. To our volunteers who assisted with preparations, the choir for their uplifting music, and all who attended—thank you for helping make each occasion truly memorable.

To our Sacramental candidates, may they continue to grow in faith, love, and wisdom as they walk their journey with Christ.

Tanya and I would like to take this opportunity to say a huge thank you to Justin Tuohy. Although his tenure here was quite short, the impact he had for us as Assistance Principals was enormous. He truly demonstrated a Christ-Centred leader, consistently demonstrating kindness, compassion, empathy and support to all this he led.

Thank you once again for your continued partnership and support. Together, we ensure St Peter's remains a vibrant, forward-thinking, and nurturing school for all children.

Cluster Muster - during Term Four, we gather as a staff to look carefully at our school data, including standardised assessments. This examination then helps to guide our planning and goal setting for the following year. Thank you to Jo Carbone and Shelley Gaglia for their outstanding leadership throughout this process, and all staff who engaged in rigorous discussion. Our staff's ongoing engagement in reflective practice is testament to their commitment to excellence.

NAPLAN - one of the assessments that we look at during Cluster Muster is NAPLAN. In 2025, student achievement in NAPLAN was reported using four proficiency standards for each assessment area. The four proficiency levels are: exceeding, strong, developing and needs additional support. Years Three and Five students completed assessments in: Reading, Writing, Spelling, Grammar and Numeracy.

In 2025, we are proud to celebrate NAPLAN results showing that St Peter's Primary School scores above CEWA schools, State schools and the National averages in almost all areas of assessment. Whilst these results are a celebration, they have also allowed us to identify areas for potential focus and growth.

Literacy - as part of the process of refining what we do to ensure the best outcomes for our students, this year, we spent time exploring and trialling several Literacy initiatives. Thank you especially to the Pre Primary team, Year Two team, Jo Carbone and Jessica Healy for their engagement in this process. We are pleased to announce that two new literacy programs will be introduced across the whole school in 2025, with staff training taking place in January.

UFLI will be introduced for students from Pre Primary to Year Three, and Word Origins will be introduced for Years Four to Six students. UFLI is a program focused on improving literacy outcomes for children through research-based instruction, with a focus on phonics, reading skills, spelling and letter formation. Lessons follow a structured sequence so that students build skills step-by-step. Students participate in a range of multisensory activities including visual, auditory, and kinaesthetic techniques.

The Word Origins program aims to strengthen vocabulary and comprehension skills, by engaging curiosity about the evolution of language. Students are supported to decode and spell complex words and build upon their reading and writing skills. We are very excited for these programs to take shape in 2026.

Intervention - St Peter's currently runs two reading Intervention programs, MiniLit and MacquLit. I would like to thank Gemma Tsang, Jo Maranta, Bronwyn Ryan, Anna Voisey and Samantha Arnold for their leadership of these programs. We will continue to offer these intervention programs again in 2026 starting in Term Two, with testing taking place during Term One.

Similarly, we have a wonderful team of staff who support our students with Numeracy Intervention, led by Emily Welsh and supported by Jackson Lamb and Jodie Baynham. Our EMU (Extending Maths Understanding) program is accessible for those students in Year One who have shown signs of Mathematical vulnerability. This program targets Counting, Place Value, Addition, Subtraction,

Multiplication and Division. This program will continue to be implemented for identified students in 2026.

In 2025, St Peter's launched the Bond Blocks Program for identified students in Years Two to Six. The program builds on maths skills such as doubling, halving and Bonds to 10 and 20. Students will have short, sharp, targeted sessions with the focus being on basic facts used for addition and subtraction. Bond Blocks intervention will resume in 2026, following testing.

AQUINAS - the AQUINAS program is a wonderful opportunity designed to meet the advanced learning needs of students who demonstrate high academic or creative abilities. AQUINAS aims to provide more challenging and enriching learning experiences beyond the standard curriculum. This often includes advanced coursework, creative projects, critical thinking activities, or opportunities to pursue individual interests in depth. The students identified for the AQUINAS program are withdrawn from the classroom for two lessons a week across Years Three to Six. AQUINAS is available to students identified as high potential students based on various criteria, such as standardised test scores, teacher recommendations and academic performance. Thank you to Julia O'Meara for the incredible work she does with these students.

Specialists – throughout 2025, our specialist offerings in Music, Italian, Visual Arts, Dance/Drama, Science and Physical Education have once again added depth and vibrancy to our students' learning. These programs equipped our children with valuable skills and a wide range of experiences, nurturing their curiosity and inspiring a genuine enthusiasm for discovery. Thank you to all our specialist teachers for their dedication and passion this year. We would like to especially acknowledge and thank Signora Costa for her enthusiasm and love of sharing the Italian language with our students. In 2026, we are excited to begin AUSLAN as our new language offering and look forward to seeing our students engage with this wonderful learning opportunity.

Social Emotional – once again this year, St Peter's students have built upon their social emotion skills and literacy, supported by the Kimochis and UR Strong programs. These programs support students with identifying their own emotions, building resilience, developing the skills to self-regulate, identify healthy friendships and manage friendship fires with confidence and respect. Thank you to Shelley Gaglia for continuing to lead our staff in this space.

Outdoor Learning – quality Catholic Education, along with the Early Years Learning Framework, outlines the importance of providing educational opportunities in both indoor and outdoor spaces. In 2025, our teachers embraced many opportunities to go beyond the classroom walls and engage in learning in nature. We would like to specifically acknowledge the Year Two team that has introduced Bush School in Term Four, seeing our students immersed in learning experiences in an outdoor setting. We are excited to see these opportunities and experiences continue to flourish in 2026.

The areas discussed are just a snapshot of the incredible opportunities our St Peter's students have. This is due to the passion, dedication and commitment of St Peter's staff who continually go 'above and beyond' to provide exceptional education experiences. Thank you to our whole St Peter's staff for continually demonstrating unity and a desire for growth and excellence. Your efforts are truly appreciated

The year commenced with some priority maintenance works to ensure the ongoing safety of students and staff. Maintenance has continued throughout the year, according to a maintenance plan developed in the early part of 2025, and included painting, flooring in some classrooms and gutter repairs / replacements among other minor works. More recently, the school canteen has been fully refurbished and I have it on good authority from my eldest, Audrey, who regularly volunteers her time during recess and lunch..."it is sooo much better now, like nice, more like an 8 or a 9, not a..." I will let you fill in that blank. For others with year 6 children, you know this is high praise. Finally, we also celebrated our new early years block this year with the official opening and it is so wonderful to see this as a thriving hub of the school. This will be enhanced further as a new, nature based, play area is constructed over the upcoming school holidays.

The school continues to have strong enrolment numbers with a growing waitlist and daily requests from families, both in the immediate area and beyond, to enrol their children at our school. Our enrolment numbers in the early years pre-kindy to year 3 remain strong and consistent. As a SAC, we continue to be cognisant of the small shift in enrolment numbers that occurs in year 4 as some students depart to another school and will work through 2026 to implement strategies to mitigate this where possible.

On behalf of the School Advisory Council, I can report the school is in a strong financial position with a healthy balance sheet. This is reflective of strong financial stewardship and importantly, the comprehensive governance and dedicated work carried out by Tony Hunter, our Finance Officer. I also want to acknowledge Keith D'Sa, the SAC Treasurer for always keeping us informed at SAC meetings.

It continues to be an absolute pleasure to be Chairperson on the School Advisory Council. From my perspective, we are a collegial group that brings various skills and expertise which only serve to benefit the necessary discussions had and decisions made. I sincerely thank each of them for their commitment to the SAC and ultimately our school. I would like to note outgoing members, Keith D'Sa who has completed a three year tenure and Nicole Edwards who has resigned from her position, and thank them for their contributions. I very much look forward to working with existing members and the ones to be elected this evening into 2026.

On behalf of the SAC, I want to thank the ongoing work of the P&F. We are all time pressured in our day to day lives and your willingness to take on this extra work, to fundraise for the school and perhaps more importantly, play such a significant role in building community is much appreciated. I also want to thank Father Jeronimo for the ongoing faith leadership he provides to the school and for being a friend to so many.

Finally, I want to sincerely thank you, our families and wider community, for your patience, support, and good humour throughout the year. It has made all the difference. Thank you and dare I say, Merry Christmas and Happy New Year.
